Getting to know us!

My name is Thomas and I am 73 years old. As you can see I have a guide dog. His name is "Nelson". A few years ago, as the old song goes, 'my eyes went dim and I could not see' I was told my sight wouldn't get better and perhaps get worse and I was put on the list for a dog. After much training etc. Nelson arrived! He is a great help and guides me everywhere; He is a very clever dog. 55 years ago I met a better guide who walks with me and talks with me and tells me I am his own. His name is Jesus, do you know him? My parents were Christians and taught us from the Bible in Romans 3:23 that we were born sinners. We heard about Heaven and that our sin needed to be blotted out if we ever hoped to be there for it is a holy place. Revelation 22:27 makes that clear.



I lived on the main Shankill Road, upstairs to my Father's shop.

As I got older I didn't appreciate my parent's values. My companions went places I was not allowed to go; my brother, my two sisters and I had restraints put on us. I soon picked up bad habits and began going places my parents didn't know about. I developed a love for dancing and live music. We moved house to 3 miles up the road and many a night I missed the last bus and had to walk home. Some nights I would have thoughts about my soul and eternity but they never lasted very long. I had a large group of companions, boys and girls, none of whom went to any place of worship. (Later some of these lads spent many years in prison during the "troubles")

Two men came into the district to preach and my Father asked us to attend. My sister became a Christian at that time. Soon after another preacher, Mr. Knox came to preach in a small hall near where we lived and my brother got saved. I had no interest; I was happy with sin, its pleasure and my companions.

But sometimes God speaks loudly. As my Father was serving in his shop he fell to the floor and died at the young age of 48, but all was well with his soul for he was saved. This spoke to me as I looked into his casket and asked myself "If that were you, where would your soul be?" I knew the answer, I would not be in Heaven like my Father. God was speaking to me through these happenings: In one stroke he removed all my barriers: I didn't smoke at home, I wasn't going dancing and all my companions stayed away.

I started to think about Calvary and the Lord Jesus dying for sinners. He was punished for sins not his own but for mine (Isaiah 53:5) I believed it and was saved according to Romans 10:9 When Eva and I married, we looked for a place to meet with other Christians who gather as they did in the NT and we found them in Newtownbreda Gospel Hall where we have been going since.



Here is a story in the Bible that we would encourage you to read to find out what happens next

Two believers were walking home from Jerusalem on the Sunday evening after the crucifixion. They were very sad because they had seen the man whom they had followed taken and crucified by the Romans. They had believed that he was the one who would have redeemed and brought blessing to their nation. As they walked someone drew near to them and began to walk alongside them. For some strange reason they did not recognise him but actually he was the one whom they were thinking about. They did not realise that he was no longer dead but alive. Read the fascinating story of this incident in Luke chapter 24 to find out what happened next in the story.

He had been at the pool side at the sheep market in Jerusalem for 38 years hoping for a miracle to cure him of his paralysis. One day a man came to the pool and knowing that he had been there for so long a time asked him, "Would you like to be made whole?" Read the exciting account of what happened next in John chapter 5.

This question is of vital importance because your eternal destiny depends upon your answer to it. Do you know why Jesus died? If not, perhaps God has sent this magazine article across your path to tell you.

Sin brings death

In God's Word, the Bible, we learn that death came into the world because of sin. "Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned" (Romans 5:12). "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). We all die because we are sinners; we have forfeited our right to live on the earth. "All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).

Jesus died for us

Did Jesus die because He had sinned? No. Listen to the inspired Word of God: "In Him is no sin" (1 John 3:5); "Who did no sin" (1 Peter 2:22); "Who knew no sin" (2 Corinthians 5:21). Therefore, death had no claim upon Him. But, blessed be His Name, He "gave Himself for our sins" (Galatians 1:4). It was love to us poor sinners that caused the Lord Jesus Christ to come down from heaven and die on Calvary's cross. It was love to us that held Him on that shameful cross until He had finished the work of atonement to the glory of God.

A holy, righteous, just God cannot let sin go unpunished. On the cross the Lord Jesus bore God's judgement against sin in our stead, as our substitute; and now God is offering not only forgiveness, but also justification to the repentant sinner who believes in Jesus. He is "just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus" (Romans 3:26). God showed His approval of that mighty work by raising the Lord Jesus from among the dead and seating Him at His own right hand in heaven. (Mark 16:19)

Jesus is the Way

There is no other way a sinner can be saved but through the atoning death of the Lord Jesus. "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

Why did Jesus die? Have you ever realized that it was your sins that caused Him to die upon the cross, or have you ever felt your need of Him as your personal Saviour? As you read this little message, He looks down from heaven upon you, and He reads the thoughts and intents of your heart. He knows your attitude toward the One who wants to be your Saviour.

Turn to Him today





The ostrich inhabits parts of Russia, China, India, and southern and eastern Africa. It is the largest living bird in the world and is easily recognized by its shaggy black feathers growing along its back and white flight and tail feathers. The ostrich cannot fly but runs at speeds of 44 mph.

The ostrich is well-designed for its environment. An ostrich has only two toes on each of its strong feet, which can produce a very powerful kick. The eyes on its small head are sharp and quick to spot predators such as lions or cheetahs. Long lashes protect their eyes from dust storms in the open scrub and savannahs. Like a periscope, the long neck raises and lowers helping the ostrich scan its habitat. When running, the long featherless legs of the ostrich make 10-foot (3 m) strides at a time. The flightless wings help maintain balance in a fast run.



The mating season varies. The male digs a shallow hole in which the female lays her 8 to 10 eggs—the largest sized egg of any living bird. (It takes 20 chicken eggs to equal the volume of one ostrich egg.) Other females may lay eggs in the same nest. The dominant female chases the other hens away and she and her mate share in the work of incubation.

An ostrich does not bury its head in the sand, but will sometimes lie flat on the ground with its neck and head straight out in front of it, making the head difficult to see, causing some to think that the head is buried in the sand.

In the Bible in Job 39:13 God asked Job, "Gavest thou the goodly wings unto the peacocks or wings and feathers unto the ostrich?" The answer of course is No; It is God who designed all the animals.
